UCC STUDENT NEWS

Saying that things have been a whirlwind since Spring Break would be a massive understatement. In that time we have been to Nicaragua, worked with Mision Para Cristo to make 20,000 (actually 19,721, but who's counting) meals to be sent to Haiti, and have had an area wide retreat. For this newsletter I wanted to focus on our work with Mision Para Cristo in Nicaragua.

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On the morning of March 9th, 14 of us (Chris and Sarah Elkins, Jon Page, Duncan Culbert, Brooke Rebstock, Tori and Gracie Cox, Bryan, Susan, Colton, and Lynzie Hackett, and Kaylee, Carson, and I) got in a van to catch a plane in Dallas. We had the privilege of worshiping and working with the churches in Jinotega, Nicaragua. Mision Para Cristo, the organization we work with, supports and encourages dozens of churches in that area. We spent our days making bricks for building projects, laying groundwork for a new fence to be built around one of the schools/ churches (the building serves as both), conducted vbs type activities within the schools, and worked with their medical clinic. One of the things I love about Mision Para Cristo is that they will work with each group to use their strengths. We have two girls (Brooke Rebstock and Gracie Cox) that have received certifications in nursing and Tori Cox has been a dental hygienist, and they were given a couple of days to work with the clinic there and help the people of

Jinotega. A typical day in Nicaragua consists of getting up for breakfast, typically a variant of breakfast tacos. While waiting for breakfast to get ready we make our lunches. This is either ham and cheese or pb&i sandwiches (as many as we want), a bag of chips, and a package of cookies. Then there is a devotional with the entire MPC staff (about 80) before going to our work sites, which we signed up for the night before. If you want to do manual labor or work with kids the entire week, you can do that. After our work day, we typically get back to the mission about 4 and have time to go to the local coffee shop before dinner. We concluded the day with dinner (the food is excellent!) and a devotional reflecting on the day. This has become one of my favorite parts because the group is going in different directions and it gives us an opportunity to share what the other work sites were like. But honestly I think most would say that the work was secondary to the people that we met. It is always incredible to me the connections I make with believers that we can't communicate very well. The Nicaraguans It is impossible to give a complete account of our trip, but hopefully the photos at the end of the newsletter gives some insight. I highly encourage you to give some thought in going with the next group, but want to extend a thank you to everyone who supported this trip through prayer, encouragement, and financial support. Our ladies went to work with Casa Materna (top left), a clinic for pregnant women to go in their last trimester to stay at while they wait to go to the hospital to deliver the baby. Our ladies pamper them during their stay. Another work we participated in was the Mobile Library. Their schools don't have libraries so the mission brings books and reads to the kids. They also do VBS style songs with the kids and play games. Gracie, Brooke, and Tori got to work with the missions medical clinic. Brooke and Gracie got to extract maggots from patient's legs. You should ask them it! The men spent most of our days making blocks for the mission. Most of the houses use tarps as the siding of their house, so it is a huge blessing to their community when the church donates their bricks to build a wall.











UCC WORKING WITH NICARAGUA

We had a very long day traveling on both ends of the trip. I was very proud of the group in having a good attitude because I knew they were tired. The trip wasn't all work. We got to experience some of the attractions in Nicaragua on our way to Jinotega. This included ziplining, going to a beautiful botanical garden, and visiting the market. When time allowed in the evenings we would go to a local coffee shop. I was able to buy a frappuccino and four pieces of cake (for our translator, Kaylee, Carson, and I) for \$8! We also found that a house across the street from where we were making blocks was selling 1/2 liter pure cane cokes in ice cold glass bottles for 40 cents a piece. I gladly bought a round for our crew and the Nicaraguans we were working with. I was also pleased that we were able to bring a little bit of our work home with us and get the church involved. We had over 80 individuals spend a Saturday afternoon at the building and make just under 20,000 meals going to Haiti! These pictures don't tell the whole story. I would love to have at least three other adults accompany me on the trip, they will mainly be there for supervision and driving vans. We will be working Monday-WEDNESDAY and will do something fun on THURSDAY before coming home. (We are having to come home a day earlier than most years so I can officiate a wedding.)

June 17-19th - JH Missions in Amarillo - \$40 (by May 27th)/\$20 (by May 12th)

Missions in Amarillo (MIA) may be one of my favorite things that we do over the summer. This is a great way to expose our students to ministries in our own backyard. This is for incoming 6th grade-freshman. We will end up performing a variety of service projects in Amarillo, some of what we can do may be limited but I think we proved over Spring Break that there is plenty of work to be done in our area.. I do not know what housing will exactly look like, but at this time I am planning to **be in need of host homes to house the kids over this week.**

June 26th-July 2nd, July 17th-23rd - Camp Blue Haven

Traditionally the majority of our students have gone to 5th session (July 17th-23rd) of Camp Blue Haven, but we have had a growing number attend 3rd session (June 26th-July 2nd).
